The Data Sharing Team is working hard to get data sharing agreements in place with DWP and Social Security Scotland but this is proving to be challenging. Our goal is to use data to target support in local areas and we will keep you updated as this progresses.

We are fully dedicated to ensuring that organisations feel secure in voicing their concerns. The upcoming survey will assist us in planning our next steps while allowing for anonymous feedback. We encourage all partners to share their insights.

This year's Child Poverty Report introduced a new focus on marginalised groups, including ethnic minorities, single parents, and individuals with disabilities. By committing to a holistic approach, we can effectively address the unique circumstances of families, and our findings will shape future policies and service designs. It is crucial to hear from NWD partners who work with these communities and organisations focused on violence against women, as their insights are vital in combating systemic poverty.

COMMUNICATION

FUNDING

Will there be sustainable long-term funding options that promote partnerships and avoid competition?

The Child Poverty Programme has established a workstream specifically focused on achieving this goal. The Funding Flexibility workstream aims to pinpoint the various policy and funding streams that could be integrated and aligned. Additionally, it seeks to persuade the Scottish Government to consider using the resources accessible to GCC in a new way, while also securing agreement to collaboratively reshape monitoring arrangements.

We want our funding approach to be informed by data and local insights which can be shaped by NWD partners.

The Demonstrations of Change will allow us to test out new ways of working and we will keep you updated on this.

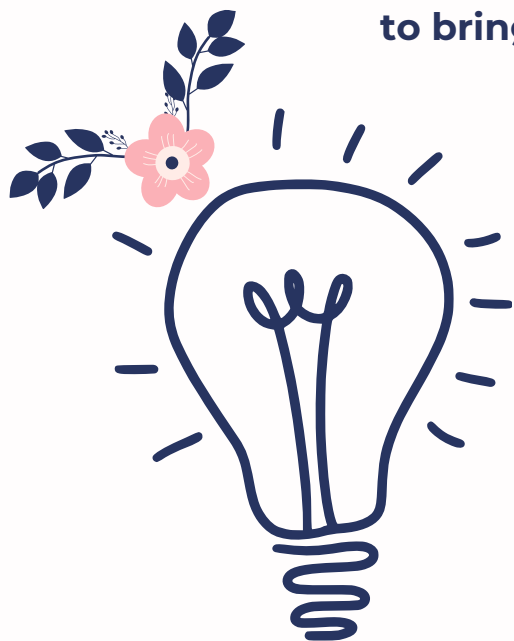


NO WRONG DOOR SOLUTIONS TEAM

DEMONSTRATIONS OF CHANGE

Several ideas were pitched in booster ward areas with no current Demonstration of Change. We will explore these ideas further and make contact with the relevant services to discuss the next steps.

CHANGING MINDSETS

Another area to explore is finding ways to engage younger generations while concentrating on the mindsets, behaviors, and attitudes that perpetuate poverty. Furthermore, it's essential to tackle the systemic foundations of poverty, including gender and racial inequalities, and weave these factors into our strategy.
